Welcome

KOPS Committee Charge

To solicit feedback from JCCC constituency groups and facilitate communication with the president's cabinet to provide input for making strategic decisions about safety and security issues.

Uvalde Lessons Learned – Presented by Guest Sergeant Seth Mullis (powerpoint)

- Went over the timeline of events during the Uvalde incident.
 - 11:28 Gunman crashes near a funeral home (in a ditch) two individuals approach to check on the driver. He then fires on the two. 9-1-1 is called about the shooting.
 - 11:30 Gunman jumps the fence around the school, entering school property
 - 11:31-32 Gunman begins firing into the school as officers are arriving
 - 11:33 Gunman enters building and heads for Room 111
 - 11:35 Officers are making entry into the school
 - 11:36 Approximately 100 rounds have been fired by the Gunman by this time
 - 11:37 Officers converge on Rooms 111 and 112
 - 12:50 entry made; Gunman killed
- The door that the gunman entered through was unlocked.
 - There had been several previous complaints about the door and a work order had been submitted.
- 376 Police Officers responded
- 142 rounds of ammunition were fired
- 21 people were killed
- 18 more people were injured
- After the incident, the Uvalde Police Department has worked on prevention, training, police response, and Command and Control.
- What is the JCCC Police Department have in place:
 - Special Operations Team
 - Team is available on scene during most major events on campus, although they may be behind the scenes and not visible on some also.
 - Entire team is First Aid certified so if any of them need to change gears and render aid, they can and will.

- Active Shooter Training
 - The SOT assists the regular patrol with training
- Equipment
 - Ballistic shields
 - Halligan tool
- ALICE
 - Get out of the victim mindset
- Door Locks
 - Being able to lock the classroom will slow the active gunman down
 - Started the pilot program in 2017 with 6 classrooms, then OHEC, then rest of campus.
- Behavior Intervention Team
 - See signs and symptoms of individuals to hopefully stop the violence.
- WE GIVE OUR TODAY, FOR YOUR TOMORROW
- Why do Police Officers study events like these?
 - You learn something new with every event.
 - Suspects are not challenging the Police they are seeing what kind of attention they can get.

Emergency Notification Drill

- Wednesday, November 16 at 9:05am
- The emergency door lock switch, when flipped to unlock, stops the power to the classroom door. The magnetic mechanism is shut off.
 - Cannot use a badge to get in, can only be opened using a Police key.
- Emergency Management would like for everyone to practice using the switch so that they are familiar with how it works.
- If you are in an area that does not have the emergency door lock switch, then practice what is best for your space.
 - Badge the door to lock it
 - Flip the lock on the door
 - Or lock the door with a key (practice is key)
- West Park can use their phone as the PA system since they do not have an actual PA System.
- If you are given a lockdown or command order, that is NOT an ALICE event.

Meeting Frequency

- Currently, we meet quarterly. We will change to meet twice in the Fall and twice in the Spring instead when the campus is most active.

BEL List

- It is important to know who the BELS are in your building – they are the safety and security team.
- Robin Boley, Scoot Simmons, and Jeff Allen are all retiring by the end of the year.

- Flex schedules have been a challenge for the BEL program with more people working from home.
- Need to come up with an interactive model of roles and responsibilities.
 - Who would do what and from where – office verses home
 - What is working for us from the college?
 - How can we make it better?
